

# HORIZON JAPANESE SMALLER COMPANIES FUND

## At a glance

### Performance\*

The Fund returned -0.97%, the Index returned 1.88% and the Sector returned 1.41%.

### Contributors/detractors

Major positive contributors were Aiful, Nihion M&A Center Holdings and Harmonic Drive Systems. Major detractors were Taiyo Yuden, Demaecan and DKK.

#### Outlook

As the index broke record highs, the underperformance of small-caps versus large-caps is approaching a historical inflection point.

## Portfolio management



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### Investment environment

- Japanese equities rose in February. This was thanks to good performance from semiconductor-related stocks, the larger weighted companies in the Nikkei225 Index announcing good results, the weaker yen and dovish comments from the Bank of Japan (BoJ) about monetary policy.
- The Nikkei225 Index finally broke through its 1989 all-time-high, a key psychological level. The current valuation of price-to-book (PBR) ratio of 2.0x for the Nikkei225 Index is a very long way from its 8.2x peak reached in December 1989.
- The first estimate of 2023 fourth quarter real GDP growth came in at -0.4% quarter-on-quarter (annualised), well below the market forecast of 1.1%. This marks a decline for the second quarter in a row. All major domestic demand categories were negative, underscoring a weak print. However, inventory cycles for manufacturing seem to be bottoming out, suggesting a recovery of Japanese manufacturing.
- Japanese small-caps underperformed large-caps in February (in addition to January) as foreign investors initially positioned into large-caps which they know well and like. We think the new NISA's strong start should see retail investors more proactive in investing in the

Japan small-cap market as retail investors have tended to invest in small-caps.

### Portfolio review

Major positive contributors were Aiful (consumer finance), Nihon M&A Center Holdings (M&A agent), Harmonic Drive Systems (factory automation), Asahi Intecc (medical devices) and Cyber Agent (internet advertising). Investors started to appreciate that Aiful's management was more focused on profit growth than top-line growth for the next fiscal year.

Shares in Nihon M&A Center rose thanks to higher-than-expected earnings results, which are now on track to break a record high. Shares in Harmonic Drive Systems rose as orders seemed to bottom-out, suggested by orders from other factory automation companies. Asahi Intecc saw its share price rise due to a rise in its market share in the US, while Cyber Agent reported higher-than-expected earnings driven by the internet ad business.

Major detractors were Taiyo Yuden (electrical parts), Demae-can (food delivery), DKK (antennas for base stations), Septeni Holdings (internet advertising) and Denka (chemicals). Shares in Taiyo Yuden fell due to a downward revision of company earnings guidance, driven by an inventory adjustment of its major product, MLCC. Shares in Demae-can and DKK declined due to weaker-than-expected quarterly results. Denka's share price also

fell due to a downward revision of company guidance, as its chemicals were negatively impacted by weak demand for electric devices such as smartphones.

We added positions in Welcia (drug stores), TRE Holdings (recycling services), Park 24 (parking lots) and Koa (electrical parts) while we initiated a position in DIP (human resources). We decreased the positions in Toyo Denki Seizo (electrical parts), Sawai Group Holdings (generic drugs) and DKK and closed the position in Noritake (electrical materials).

## Manager outlook

As the company earnings season finishes, we are now in

the middle of management interviews with all the companies we hold in the portfolio and adjusting holding sizes in line with any revised conviction levels.

We have added some new themes such as labour shortages, price hikes, improving shareholder returns and increasing institutional interest in Japanese smaller companies. As the index broke record highs, the underperformance of small-caps versus large-caps is approaching a historical inflection point.

#### Investment policy

The Fund invests at least two-thirds of its assets in a portfolio of shares (equities) and equity-related securities of smaller companies, in any industry, in Japan. The Fund may also invest in other assets including companies of any size, cash and money market instruments. The Investment Manager may use derivatives (complex financial instruments) to reduce risk or to manage the Fund more efficiently. The Fund is actively managed with reference to the Russell/Nomura Small Cap Index, which is broadly representative of the companies in which it may invest, as this forms the basis of the Fund's performance target and the level above which performance fees may be charged (if applicable). The Investment Manager has discretion to choose investments for the Fund with weightings different to the index or not in the index, but at times the Fund may hold investments similar to the index.

### Investment strategy

The Investment Manager believes in-depth stock analysis, coupled with superior stock picking are the main drivers of superior long-term performance in Japanese smaller companies. The Fund is designed to capture the undervalued growth potential of Japanese smaller companies by typically investing in the smallest 25% of listed Japanese companies by market capitalisation using a disciplined, pragmatic and risk-aware investment process. The investment approach focuses on stock valuation, investment catalysts and long-term structural growth to drive earnings and returns.

#### Fund specific risks

When the Fund, or a share/unit class, seeks to mitigate exchange rate movements of a currency relative to the base currency (hedge), the hedging strategy itself may positively or negatively impact the value of the Fund due to differences in short-term interest rates between the currencies.
