# Investment environment

Macroeconomic volatility and dispersion between asset classes continued during the second quarter. This presented an improved environment for active stock pickers, and particularly for long/short investors such as ourselves. Technology stocks led global equity markets higher, while growth-style stocks generally outperformed value-style stocks, driven by a narrow cohort of companies expected to benefit from developments linked to artificial intelligence (AI). Meanwhile, weakness in sovereign bonds (higher yields) reflected hawkish messages from central banks amid persistently high inflation.

# Portfolio review

Overall, the long book was positive for fund returns while the short book detracted marginally.

The emergence of AI as a theme within capital markets drove positive returns within both the fund's core and tactical book. Core long holdings in Microsoft and Oracle performed well, driven by expectations around growth in cloud infrastructure. A number of tactical long positions, including Nvidia and Palantir, also became immediate investment proxies for the AI theme. We also took advantage of share price weakness in some businesses perceived as being at risk from AI disruption. This included increasing the long position in professional data provider RELX, and its share price subsequently rebounded as investors began to recognise that Generative AI could in fact prove a tailwind to the company's earnings. In addition, UK-listed medical equipment manufacturer Smith & Nephew contributed positively as the company reported strong first quarter results and investor concerns eased over Chinese procurement changes within sports medicine. While we took some profit in the position, we continue to back the new CEO's turnaround plan to re-establish revenue growth. In the short book, the fund's UK REIT exposure contributed positively as the market digested the implications of the Bank of England (BoE)'s surprise 50 basis point (bps) interest rate hike.

Performance detractors included the fund's core long position in BP after the UK oil major slowed the rate of share buy-backs as oil prices declined given concerns about demand, particularly in China. We added to the position based on the share price weakness. Elsewhere, we opened a new short position in a global consumer technology business. This detracted as US growth remained more durable than anticipated. The fund's exposure to US building material companies was also negative, as US infrastructure activity remained resilient.

In terms of activity, the continuation of more logical stock dispersion led us to open a number of tactical trades across multiple sectors, including pair trades within the media, automotive and financial sectors. Overall net exposure to the latter increased, and in particular in insurers, which we believe are positioned to potentially benefit from a boost to profitability amid the higher-for-longer interest rate narrative. We re-established a long position in car and aero-engine manufacturer Rolls Royce. Here, the new management team continued to turnaround the business, while there was support from the continuing recovery in Asian travel. In addition, we increased the fund's long position in the industrials sector via new positions in Trane Technologies and Parker Hannifin. Trane is a leading manufacturer of climate control products for heating, ventilation, air conditioning and transport solutions benefiting from structural demand as companies invest to drive efficiency gains and meet environmental targets. Parker Hannifin is a manufacturer of value-add industrial components with a relentless focus on productivity gains.



# Manager outlook

The fund's gross exposure continued to rise. In our view, the investment environment is improving with greater, more rational dispersion between assets, particularly along valuation lines. This is consistent with our historical experience of higher discount rates. Meanwhile, the fund's net exposure remains lower, reflecting the balance of risks facing equity markets. Central banks are being clear that elevated interest rates will be required for a longer period than many expect, which creates a headwind to valuations (higher discount rate) as well as a higher cost of financing for many leveraged companies. However, we are optimistic that the changes in market structure suit our investment process and we expect the fund's gross exposure to rise further as our conviction levels increase.

# **Investment policy**

The Fund invests in shares and makes extensive use of derivatives (complex financial instruments) to take both 'long' and 'short' positions in companies the investment manager believes will either rise in value (long positions) or fall in value (short positions) meaning that the Fund may benefit from either scenario

The Fund will hold a significant proportion of its assets in cash and money market instruments as a result of holding derivatives and for when the investment manager wishes to take a defensive stance. Conversely, the Fund may also employ 'leverage' (so that the Fund can invest a greater amount than its actual value) when the investment manager has greater confidence in the opportunities available.

Typically, at least 60% of the exposure to the long and short positions (in aggregate) will be to companies of any size, in any industry, in the UK. Companies may be incorporated or headquartered in the UK, deriving significant revenue from the UK, or listed on the London Stock Exchange. Up to 40% of the long and short exposure may be to non-UK companies. The Fund may also invest at the Investment Manager's discretion in other Transferable Securities, derivative instruments and collective investment schemes.

The investment manager has complete discretion to choose investments for the Fund and is not constrained by a benchmark
