Investment environment

Equity markets were negatively impacted during August by long-dated US Treasury yields hitting 10-year highs, negative US GDP growth revisions and weakening manufacturing data. Technology equities modestly underperformed broader market indices, as they seemed to digest some very robust outperformance so far this year.

Portfolio review

The fund returned -1.9% versus a benchmark return of -2.2%.

The holding in Arista contributed positively to performance after allaying market concerns of demand weakness at hyperscaler customers and delivering very strong growth in its enterprise business. Arista is also increasingly seen by the market as well placed to benefit from the high-speed and bandwidth networking requirements of artificial intelligence (Al). Visa and Mastercard also helped fund performance after reports that the companies both intend to increase credit card fees. Visa's intra-quarter update also pointed to improving international and domestic payment trends and stable cross-border volumes. NVIDIA once again contributed positively to performance as demand accelerated for its graphics processing units (GPUs), which are fundamental for running generative Al models.

Infineon was a headwind to performance as concerns emerged that its margins may have peaked after the company began to see margin pressure in its automotive segment. Despite seeing strength from its Al product portfolio, Marvell was another detractor, as customers across storage, enterprise networking and telecom equipment are experiencing a period of material inventory digestion. Adyen negatively impacted performance after the company reported a more pronounced slowdown in payment volume growth than the market had been expecting, due to increasing price competition in the US. Ambarella also detracted from performance as the ongoing inventory correction and weak end-market demand, particularly within its Internet of Things customer base, resulted in a material downgrade to revenue expectations.

In terms of activity, we initiated positions in AMD and Pure Storage, where we like the potential from AI in terms of increased GPU and storage spending. We also initiated a position in Veeva, the market leader in customer relationship management and research and development (R&D) software for the life sciences industry. We exited Zebra Technologies after the company disclosed it was experiencing elevated macroeconomic challenges with longer sales cycles and greater uncertainty over customer capital expenditure budgets. We also closed the positions in ASML and Tenable, seeing better risk-reward opportunities elsewhere.

Manager outlook

Unappreciated earnings continue to be the most significant driver of returns for the technology sector. We expect that there will be more focus on infrastructure spend to support AI, and a continued push to electrification driven by both government support and consumer appeal across all regions. Combined with the significant job cuts witnessed across the technology sector over the latter part of 2022, we think this could drive stronger profitability growth in the second half of 2023. However, we remain mindful of the ongoing risks of a slowing global economy.

While the economic reopening phase in China has been disappointing in terms of growth, we continue to believe that Chinese internet companies are now better positioned for profit margin expansion this year. However, the fund's exposure to China remains modest given the ongoing impact of geopolitical tensions on company share prices.



As technology fund managers, we are excited by the potential for generative Al to underpin the next major technology wave, further accelerate digital transformation and generate future investment opportunities. But as ever, we remain vigilant of the hype cycle around Al. Following the market falls of 2022, valuations for the sector are now back to being at a significant premium to broader equities. We view this as justified for the mega caps given their above-average earnings visibility. However, as economic growth slows, with an unlikely return to extremely low borrowing costs, we continue to see vulnerability among the stocks with the weakest balance sheets and most extended expectations and valuations. We continue to invest in companies where we see unappreciated earnings power - unappreciated in terms of strength and sustainability or growth but also in terms of the what the valuation might already reflect.

We remain focused on the global technology leaders of today and companies with the potential to be the leaders of tomorrow. We believe the fund remains well positioned to benefit from the next wave of Al, in the next-generation infrastructure it requires and the process automation and new digital experiences (Internet 3.0) it will facilitate. Our investment process gravitates towards high-quality technology companies, and we remain consistent in applying our unique approach of navigating the hype cycle, applying valuation discipline and identifying attractive growth/valuation combinations. We will continue to engage proactively with the companies we hold on their role in being responsible disruptors and generating value for all stakeholders.

Investment policy

The Fund invests at least 90% of its assets in a concentrated portfolio of shares (equities) and equity-related securities of companies, of any size, which are technology-related or derive profits from technology, in any country.
